
The dates for the Society and Sea Conference 2020: The Values of the Ocean and Coasts for Sustainable Development are: Wednesday 9<sup>th</sup> to Friday 11<sup>th</sup> September 2020. This international Conference is hosted by the Greenwich Maritime Centre, National Maritime and Royal Museums Greenwich and supported by Thames Estuary Partnership, Coastal Partnership Network and the Marine Social Science Network. As part of exploring the values of the ocean and coasts for sustainable development from multi-disciplinary and multi-sector perspectives the conference is looking for contributions around the

following themes:

Blue Economy, Coastal Communities, Migration, Gender and diversity, Environment and Conservation, Wellbeing and Mental Health, Fisheries and Governance.

A first call for papers will be issued in October 2019 and abstracts will be drawn from an international audience. All papers should be submitted and presented in English. CoastSnap Mozambique

Launched this summer, Coastsnap Mozambique with the creation of four CoastSnap stations and community workshops at the three project locations: Mozambique Island (Nampula), Ponta do Ouro beach (Maputo) and Tofo beach (Inhambane). CoastSnap is a citizen science tool, used in many locations worldwide and launched by the Water Research Laboratory (at UNSW Sydney) in Australia, to obtain long-term and cost-effective data to monitor coastal changes. Participants take pictures of the beach from a specific viewpoint where a fixed metal stand is installed. The stand holds the smartphone and ensures pictures are always taken from the same position. These pictures are then shared with the project team on social media or by email.

This allows the project team to build, over time, a database of images to understand shoreline behaviour, to analyse erosion, storm impacts and social beach uses.

There are CoastSnap stations in around 40 locations across 10 countries, but this is the first time Coastsnap has arrived on the African continent! This project is funded by the <u>Rising from the Depths Network</u>, and is led by Bournemouth University (UK) in collaboration with Eduardo Mondlane University and Lurio University (Mozambique).

You are encouraged to participate in the project! #### A joint ESRC/ NERC Programme

UK Research & Innovation (UKRI) are inviting applications for the role of Champion for the Sustainable Management of UK Marine Resources (SMMR) research programme. The £12.4m SMMR programme will be jointly delivered by the Natural Environment Research Council (NERC) and the Economic and Social Research Council (ESRC) on behalf of UKRI, and in partnership with the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (Defra) and Marine Scotland.

The Champion will act as thought leader, flag bearer and strategy owner for the SMMR research programme. The successful candidate will work with the wider research communities to aid in the development of the SMMR funding call and activities to ensure that the programme delivers its objectives. They will be responsible for working with the academic community to drive integration of research across the programme and providing leadership on the interaction of the programme with the user community, as involvement with these stakeholders from the outset will be important to the successful delivery of the programme.

New Book Launch: "Small-scale fishing in Cap de Creus: a look into the future" A new book about the biological and socioeconomic challenges facing Small Scale Fisheries in Cape Creus (Catalonia, Spain; NW Mediterranean) has been published with the support of the Natural Park of Cap de Creus. The book entitled "Small-scale fishing in Cap de Creus: a look into the future" does not only describe the activity of

small-scale fishing as we understand it, with the different fishing techniques, fishermen, captured species and fishing methods, but also covers the cultural legacy and historical tradition of this fishery. According to the director of the Natural Park, Mss. Victòria Riera, "it is precisely the dual biological and socioeconomic perspective of small-scale fishing that makes such interesting reading". The authors of the book, Dr. Sílvia Gómez (social anthropologist at the Autonomous University of Barcelona) and Dr. Josep Lloret (marine and fisheries biologist at the University of Girona) explore the socioeconomic and biological causes that have led to the crisis in smallscale fishing in this area (a similar situation occurs in many other Mediterranean areas) and propose a series of management measures to make small-scale fishing sustainable in the long term, with a responsible use of the resources. These measures should make small-scale fishing sustainable from a biological and ecological point of view, economically profitable and from a social angle, maintain small fisher's livelihoods in accordance with the cultural legacy and knowledge of its patrimonial, historical and identifying values, which is paramount to achieve sustainable small-scale fishing.

# Fisheries, Aquaculture. Human health & wellbeing, Transport, Tourism, Coastal community adaptation and resilience and Ocean literacy

To help with this review, it would be great to hear from the community for any projects people have been involved in (past or present) that relate to marine climate change on these subtopics. The more evidence that can be gathered, the more this can help to inform Defra on what work has been completed in this area. Projects must be focused in the UK, but can include ones funded by Government, research councils, NGOs or other sources.
